The District was a bright star in the crown of the multi-district only a few years ago, but we are one of 4 that had negative numbers last year. If your club is in trouble, please ask for assistance. It can't be ignored any longer. It's all of our responsibilities to recruit new members to join us in our endeavors to help our fellow Tennesseans when they are in need.

I was extremely pleased with the number of Lions who were at the cabinet meeting and stayed for the planning session that followed. Thank you for your efforts, I know that giving up a Saturday is difficult and I do appreciate it. I will be attending the Multi-District Council meeting next week and we will be discussing a special project to establish a Tennessee State Lions Summer Camp for the Sight and Hearing Impaired, to be held in our State at a site to be determined later. I was surprised last year when our district was asked to help sponsor a young person to go to camp out side of the State, and found out that none of the other districts have a site to send our Sight and Hearing Impaired. If any of you know of a site or a camp that we could partner with, let me know so that we will be able to best help those in need.

The web site is being reworked and will take on a new look in a few weeks and we hope that it will be easier for individuals to add pictures and articles. I have found that it is almost impossible to keep our current address rosters current, with the rapid change of e-mail addresses and phone numbers. **Lions Volunteer Blind Industries, Inc.
Annual Report 2009/10**

"We will provide blind people with the dignity of independence thru employment."

The combined efforts of all team members resulted in another successful year at LVBI! Our sales for FY 10 closed at \$13.5 million, up \$900,000 from last year!

National Industries for the Blind and it's affiliates (LVBI) have made it clear to our customers at all levels that the Javits-Wagner-O'Day Act is an EMPLOYMENT program, not a PROCUREMENT program! Our mission is to grow employment opportunities for blind Tennesseans. To that end, in FY '10 we added 12 new blind workers to the LVBI payroll, and 13 disabled workers to our sister company, TNVol Mfg. & Services, bringing our total hourly work force in FY 09/10 to: 106 blind, 19 severely disabled, and 27 sighted direct labor employees in both companies. During peak surge periods, additional temporary workers were also used to meet delivery requirements. LVBI's Direct Labor Blind ratio of hours worked in FY '10 is 83%, and 45% Direct Labor Handicapped for TNVol Mfg. TNVol's goal is to be at 75% by this time next year. Our long-term commitment is to grow by 50 additional jobs over the next 5 years!

LVBI's annual payroll to blind workers topped \$1.2 million and disabled workers received \$165,000 for a total of \$1,418,000. Approximately 20%, or \$283,000 of that payroll is committed to Employment Scholarships funded, in part, for "Project Paycheck" donations. With aggressive promotion of our fund raising efforts, this year's donations are the best ever, with over \$120,805 received from all sources.

The majority of those donations will go to meet "Paycheck" expenses, with the balance paid by LVBI.

A new initiative was begun this year to expand the Johnson City, TN facility to house additional manufacturing and a Call Center for new employment and training for blind people in technology related fields. A "10/50 Capital Campaign" has begun to raise \$75,000 through local Lions Clubs, to be matched with a \$75,000 grant from Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF). The initial **10/50 Campaign** in May resulted in **\$24,205!** Our goal is to add 10K sq. ft. to that facility to house 50 new jobs within 5 years.

LVBI's vocational rehabilitation department, "Opportunity East" continues it long relationship with the TN Division of Rehabilitation Services (DRS), providing

Two Karns Lions Mark Half-Century

The Karns Lions Club meeting Monday evening at the Karns Pool will be a special one. Members will enjoy a meal, and then they'll honor two of their own. Joe Dailey and Bill Shannon are celebrating their 50th years as members of the organization.

The club received its charter in 1954, and both men joined in 1960. Dailey's dad was one of the founding members, so it was natural for him to join. His sons Gary and Rick joined the club, and now his granddaughter and her husband, Lacey and Tony Fleming, are members of the Karns Lions.

Along the way, Dailey and Jackie, his wife of 61 years, have been involved in a variety of Lions projects. The Karns Lions built the original Karns High School football field that was situated where the elementary school is now located. Dailey says Knox County couldn't afford it, so members signed notes to get enough money to build the stadium and hoped they wouldn't lose their homes in the process.

In 1969, Dailey and other Lions Club members again signed notes. This time the money went toward building the community pool. Members and their spouses worked at the pool during their vacations. The club sold the land on which the Karns Volunteer Fire Department is located, and it leases the land for little league fields and the community center for \$1 a year. Dailey served as president of the Tennessee Lions Eye Bank in the 1990s.

Bill Shannon joined the Lions Club for a different reason. He had a cousin who was blind, and he became interested in the club's work with sight conservation. He worked to get glasses for children and adults and tirelessly collected money every October for White Cane Days. He also served on the board of directors for the Blind Training Center in Arkansas.

Shannon and his wife, Jean, have been married for 62 years and have two children. They have enjoyed opportunities to help others, and Shannon says that he's developed some close friendships with other members through the years. The success the Lions Club has had in Karns shows what can happen when people join forces in a common cause.

He says he's had fun with projects throughout the years. They've had fundraisers for the pool and shot mistletoe out of trees for sales. Shannon says he's proud of how the club reaches out to the community with parks and food baskets. Service is the key to the Lions Club's existence.

Together, Joe Dailey and Bill Shannon have given 100 years of service to the Karns Lions Club. They both hope that future generations will preserve the club's strong presence in the Karns community

comprehensive services to blind and disabled Tennesseans. We are an important regional service center, touching 192 clients annually, with 96% living within Lions International district 12-N in East Tennessee. DRS contracts with LVBI to provide these services annually, with this year's budget at \$333,717. In the coming year, LVBI and "Opportunity East" will propose a grant to DRS to partner in the expansion of our facility and Call Center training/employment initiative in Johnson City. Our Call Center proposes to hire 28 blind people and out-place 20 in related employment over the next 5 years!

Our goals are ambitious:

- Double the size of our Johnson City facility,
- Establish a Call Center training and placement program for technology-related employment for blind people,
- Grow our employment by 50 jobs in 5 years.

To meet these goals we will need capital, resources, talent, and commitment for all our team members and our partners. There is an old challenge that says "if you don't know where you are going, how will you know when you get there?" We know where we are going, and we **WILL** get there!
