MEMO FROM MILLIE

Dear District 12N Lions,

I do hope this finds everyone Safe and Healthy. The COVID19 Pandemic has changed all of our lives, yet no two of us are experiencing this crisis in the same way. In the middle of March 2020, I don't think any of us saw the changes that we would be dealing with by the end of the month. And indeed, these have been changes as they are from outside influences that we have no control over. As most of you know, I am a proponent of USA/Canada Forum. I am so grateful that I went to Spokane in September and attended the seminar by



Rick Battaglia "Making Change Stick: Managing Transitions" because his presentation gave insight to the difference between Change and Transition. According to him and a number of others far more experienced than I am, there is a distinction between change and transition even though many use the terms interchangeably. In his session I learned that change is brought on by external influences that usually are out of our control, for example COVID19 is a change to our lives. Transition on the other hand is the internal response to change. Rick spoke about the three stages of transition. Change starts with Endings, then the Neutral phase, and the New Beginnings. This is a process much like the "Kubler-Ross model" on Death and Dying as not all people go through the process in the same order or rate, but ultimately get to acceptance. In the case of Transition the final step being New Beginnings. I personally believe that many of us are somewhere in the second "Neutral" stage with some of our responses being anxiety, low morale, resentment, skepticism, a sense of loss, and/or questioning. In order to get to the "New Beginning" stage we will need to increase our willingness to Learn new processes and ways of serving always keeping in mind that as Lions "We Serve".

As we move forward into the post COVID-19 world, I will be sharing many of the ideas and processes that I have learned as I prepared to move into the role of District Governor for the East Tennessee Lions of District 12N. I am by no means asking people to follow blindly. I am just asking that you keep an open mind as we all transition, knowing that we undoubtably will need to make adjustments along the way. I do know that many are looking for a solution as we navigate this stressful time, but some of my Dad's advice is ringing in my ears. Two of which are "If at first you don't succeed: try, try again" and "Rome wasn't built in a day". I look forward to your help as the Lions of District 12N Transition. I also ask that we all remember that we are all in this together and that Kindness Matters. We will get through this by first being kind to each other. Thanks so much for your service and Stay Safe and Healthy.

My purpose in sending this message is to inform each of you that the Sevier County Lions Club vision clinic scheduled for Saturday, May 9th, 2020 at the First Baptist Church GN building has been cancelled due to the continued restrictions from the COVID-19 pandemic. Since it may be awhile before large groups of 200+ people can gather in the same area, we are tentatively planning to reschedule our clinic for Saturday, August 1, 2020 at the same location (but of course this is subject to change again). If you had already told us that you would be available to work with us at the clinic then we hope that you will also be available on August 1st. Please put this date on your calendar so that you can set aside the day to help us provide eye exams and glasses to at least 250 scheduled patients at this clinic. Even more so now, people are going to need assistance with their basic eye care needs due to losses of revenue during these last few months so it is important for our club to plan to offer this service just as soon as it is determined safe to do so.

Thank you, everyone, for your willingness to help the people of Sevier County with their vision needs. We will keep you updated during the upcoming weeks and months.

LIONS IN ACTION

KNOX NORTH LION'S CLUB SETS A PLACE AT THE TABLE

Knox North Lions Club partners in many missions in our community but one of those is our involvement in a ministry to the homeless in Knoxville called A Place

At The Table, a non-profit organization providing home cooked meals, clothing and other necessities like toilet paper, batteries, bandaids, and so much more.

The 35 volunteers of A Place At The Table meet with their homeless friends every Monday night no matter what the weather under an interstate bypass in the heart of the city. They serve approximately 200 people each week with dignity, respect, and love.

Who are these homeless individuals? As club president Lion Frank Carusone says, "These men and women are our invisible



neighbors, the ones in need we don't want to see. They live in camps by the railroad tracks, near the river, under bypasses, and in subsidized housing where they can barely pay the rent."

They are vets with PTSD, seniors in low cost apartments trying to live only on their meager social security checks, abused women who have fled their homes, students who can't afford both rent and tuition. They are the mentally ill who can't afford services. They are the medically bankrupt and those who work fast food jobs for \$13 an hour. Each individual has their own story of why and how they came to be homeless at this time

The Knox North Lion's Club learned about A Place At the Table from Lion Patricia Ramsden who co-ordinates the necessities station for the program and serves on their board. One of the most poignant stories she tells is of an older man who worked in a factory most of his life until his wife came down with cancer. He had to miss work to take her to treatments and care for her on her worst days. Eventually he was fired because of his absences. They lost their medical insurance. Then they lost their home and were forced to live under the bypass until his beloved wife died in his arms there.

Lion Herbert Harville

Longtime Hamblen County Commissioner, educator and community leader Herbert Harville died this morning. He was 91.

Harville, who served on the Hamblen County Commission for 28 years, is survived by his wife, Bobbie Harville and his son and daughter, Stan Harville and Ann Harville.

He earned a degree in mathematics and taught in the Hamblen County school system before county commissioners elected him as the first superintendent of the combined Morristown-Hamblen County school system. Throughout his adult life, he was involved in supporting civic organizations that supported the underprivileged.



Larry Baker, who served on the county commission for 40 years, says he first met Harville in 1970, a half-century ago. "He was knowledgeable and a heck of a mathematician," Baker said. "He was an educator of the first degree. He was just dedicated to the school system and he was very opinionated. It was his way or the highway with most everything down there. He led us through the combining of the school systems and did a pretty good job of it."

Harville's commitment to children went beyond the classroom. Eddie Davis, former director of the Youth Emergency Shelter, noted Harville served on that organization's board for more the two decades. "He was a founding father of the Shelter," Davis said.
