<u>Don't forget to file your IRS Form 990-N to pre</u> <u>serve your club's Tax Exempt status</u>

Most small tax-exempt organizations whose annual gross receipts are normally \$50,000 or less are required to electronically submit Form 990-N, also known as the e-Postcard, unless they choose to file a complete Form 990 or Form 990-EZ instead. Most Clubs in our district are 501 (c)(4) organizations under the IRS Tax Code and are exempt from federal income taxes so long as the file the required form 990 annually.

If you do not file your *e-Postcard* on time, the IRS will send you a reminder notice, however, club treasurers and secretaries often change frequently leaving the IRS with a bogus address. There is no penalty assessment for late filing the *e-Postcard*, but an organization that fails to file required *e-Postcards* (or information returns – Forms 990 or 990-EZ) for three consecutive years will automatically lose its tax-exempt status. Loosing tax exempt status may require your club to pay back taxes on moneys your club took in even though it was used for administrative or charitable purposes.

The *e-Postcard* is due every year by the 15th day of the 5th month after the close of your tax year. For Lions Clubs the tax year ends June 30, therefore the tax filing date is November 15. It is a simple process if you have your club's tax number (EIN). You just attest that your club did not have revenues exceeding \$50,000.00 Online access for filing your Form 990-N can be found at:

SMOKY MOUNTAIN LIONS CHARITIES, INC. (SMLC) MOBILE VI-SION LAB (MVL)

SMOKY MOUNTAIN LIONS CHARITIES, INC. just completed the first year of operation of the MVL. The first mission was on October 23, 2013 at the Tennessee School for the Deaf. The tenth mission was at the Fountain City Lions Club House. Missions were held monthly except for November and December. They provided 504 pair of eyeglasses at the 10 missions. An additional 38 pair were made during the test runs In June, July and August 2013. For the first ten missions recipients had to have a prescription to get a pair of eyeglasses. In August 2014



the first exams were made by SMLC. For a recipient to receive an exam and eyeglasses they must be referred to the MVL by a Lions Club or a source approved by the SMLC/MVL committee.

The MVL was operated for 39 hours and fifty-one volunteers worked 1035 hours making the eyeglasses. Not all of these volunteers were Lions. Thirty six were Lions of which three were also professionals, twelve were non-Lion/professionals and three were non-lions/non professionals.

The successful year was celebrated at an appreciation dinner for the volunteers at the Fountain City Lions Club House on September 18.
