#### **The Power in Teamwork**

With teamwork, the near impossible can not only become possible, but a reality. This was borne out recently with regard to an abandoned low vision reading instrument in Knoxville, an astute new Lions Club member, information gleaned from a Lions Club zone meeting, a dedicated Lions Club District Governor, and an ophthalmologist in Rogersville.


Mary Simpson, a new Lion with the **Knoxville Diversified Lions Club**, was helping a friend clean out a relative's house in order to put it on the market. This is where the abandoned low vision instrument was found. A little research indicated that the machine was still sought after and was worth \$3,400. Pam Maples, President of the Knoxville Diversified Lions club, took pictures of it and sent them to Lions Club 12N District Governor Millie Burke to see if she might find it a new home.

At about the same time, District 12N Lions Club 1<sup>st</sup> Vice District Governor Paulette Bailey was taking part in a Lions Club zoom meeting and learned about an individual in Rogersville who was in need of a device that would allow him/her to read again. Paulette mentioned this need to Millie in passing, and Millie sent the President of the **Rogersville Lions Club**, Tim Seaton, information and pictures of the Knoxville find. Tim, in turn, contacted Dr. Eddy Abernathy, a Rogersville ophthalmologist, and as luck would have it, the abandoned instrument was exactly what his patient needed, but couldn't afford to purchase. Now, through Lions Club teamwork, the recipient can enjoy reading once again.

When the individual no longer needs the instrument, it will come back to Knoxville Diversified Lions Club and another individual with a need for it will be found. In this way, the instrument will be kept in use throughout its lifetime. This process could be referred to as Lions Tethered Teamwork – just one more highly effective way to serve our communities.

The KidSight program will be offered in October to area Day Care Centers, Mother's Morning Out programs, and Pre-K and Kindergarten children.


In November the club will be delivering hot Thanksgiving dinners to those who cannot come to the Brazelton Lodge to eat. Last year over 100 dinners were delivered.

# White Cane Days

#### THANK YOU! Your contribution helps these Lions Projects:

#### Childhood Cancer

An initiative to expand access to life-saving treatment and provide support to the children and families who face childhood cancers.

#### Diabetes Awareness

A program designed to bring awareness of Juvenile and Adult diabetes; early detection and treatment for a disease that is the number one cause of blindness within the USA.

#### East Tennessee Lions Eye Bank

A Knoxville clearinghouse between persons donating their eyes after death and the recipients of corneal transplants. ETLEB has been ranked within the top ten in the world.

#### Lions Volunteer Blind Industries

An agency providing rehabilitation services, employment and training opportunities for hundreds of blind East Tennesseans annually.

#### Learning Ally (formerly Recording for the Blind and Dyslexic)

Learning Ally records printed texts for educational and personal pursuits providing classroom material for student with print disabilities.

#### Leader Dogs for the Blind

This agency provides guide dogs for blind persons at no cost, aiding the recipients in their mobility and independence. Several local Lions raise puppies to become leader dogs.

#### Lions Quest

A comprehensive youth development program involving home, school and community which helps to cultivate strong character in healthy young people through life skills education.

#### Tennessee School for the Blind

A state-operated school for visually impaired children located near Nashville providing educational opportunities through 12th grade. Lions fund the Boy and Girl Scout troops and provide \$50.00 for each student at Christmas.

#### Tennessee School for the Deaf

A state-operated school for children with hearing impairments located in Knoxville providing educational opportunities through 12th grade. Lions help fund personal needs for some students and the summer camp programs that are not state funded.

#### The Hearing & Speech Foundation

Empowering individuals with communication deficits to live their lives to the fullest by giving children and adults the gift of sound through hearing aids and services.

#### World Services for the Blind

A comprehensive rehabilitation center for blind adults that provides counseling for emotional and psychological adjustments to blindness as well as vocational training.



The Lions of District 12N are benefitting from our recent partnership with the Knoxville Academy of Medicine's Knoxville Area Project Access (KAPA) program. We are now able to provide free eye surgeries for up to 30 clients per year from all over our District.

The East Tennessee Lions Eye Bank (ETLEB) has provided from their reserve funds a yearly "Partnership fee" to KAPA which allows the Lions to serve in ways which were too expensive in the past but now there is a way to do so.

Patients are referred through any of the District 12N Lions Clubs. A very detailed application is required and is verified by KAPA social workers. The fully completed application then goes to a Special Services Committee at ETLEB for scrutiny and approval. It is then sent on to KAPA which within 24 hours the patient is contacted and the eligibility screening process begins.

#### Eligibility criteria is as follows:

- 1. Patient must NOT be eligible for any type of insurance or Government sponsored healthcare programs
- 2. Household income at or below 200% of the poverty level

If the social workers can find insurance for these individuals they set them up for coverage. If they are determined to be KAPA eligible, they are set up for a medical evaluation appointment. All services are provided in Knoxville so the patient is required to have services provided in Knoxville. If patient is a Knox County resident, the process is shortened as they can contact KAPA directly. To learn more, contact either Clare or Dave Crawford at 865-607-1898.

- 6.Include "MD12" somewhere within the design


#### **DEADLINE EXTENDED**

The **zodiac signs** for October are Libra (September 23 – October 22) and Scorpio (October 23 – November 21).


The birthstones for October are the tourmaline and the opal.



#### **Lions Volunteer Blind Industries**

Since June 4, 2012, Lions Volunteer Blind Industries, Inc. has maintained an Annual Employment Scholarship Giving Program: called: **PROJECT PAYCHECK.** 

While many of our blind workers meet or exceed expected job standards, there are others who strive daily to meet those goals in spite of disabilities. LVBI's "Project Paycheck" giving program helps those workers through an Employment Scholarship, which pays each worker A competitive wage as they learn to earn.

Lions Volunteer Blind Industries must remain competitive in the market place. However, we have accepted the added challenge of providing equality in employment opportunities for our blind citizens.

The cost of the Employment Scholarship program continues to rise. The cost of supporting this program is \$300,000. - \$500,000, depending on levels of blind employment. Approximately 25% annually coming from sponsoring Lions Clubs and the balance of donations and our own operating income.

As a business partner with LVBI, you can take advantage of an opportunity to strengthen our relationship, and at the same time, take advantage of tax benefits through your contribution. Lions Volunteer Blind Industries is a 501 (C) 3 not-for-profit organization, and as such, all donations are tax-deductible. All donations into this fund go directly to eligible blind workers in the form of scholarship wages.


